The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board Meeting of May 26, 2022, at City Hall Council Chambers, 700 N. Main, Las Cruces, NM was brought to order at 6:00 p.m. by Chair McClure and recognized the meeting as having a legal quorum.

24 **5. Public Participation:**
25

26 Harold Johnson, a member of the Dog Park Coalition stated they are noticing a
27 couple of things he wanted to bring awareness to around the dog park. There is a
28 ponding area on the west side of the dog park and it appears some of the pine trees
29 are beginning to die in that area. The concern is if the trees start dying further that
30 with the seasonal winds that there may be branches down. He stated a great job
31 was done on cleaning up the pond. The trees have a bad image for citizens and
32 users of the park, but also it is a high activity area since it near the ballparks.
33

34 Harold Johnson's second question is that the dog park has a safety light that is
35 inoperative and has been for some time. Can the City or Parks and Recreation help
36 to get that light up and running? During the wintertime people come to the dog park
37 in early hours, and also in the evening after work and those times it is dark.
38 Occasionally Meerscheidt will leave a light or two on in the back.
39

40 Phil Catanach, Parks and Recreation, stated there is a Dog Park update further in
41 the agenda but Franco Granillo can address the questions. Franco Granillo, Parks
42 and Recreation, stated that with the trees, over the last couple of years along the
43 corridor of Hadley where the dog park resides, there has been severe die-off in a lot
44 of the trees. They consulted with Jeff Anderson, the County Tree Expert, and also
45 with agents outside of the City, samples to NMSU, and another laboratory and
46 University in Texas. The results have come back showing we have a mite in town

1 that is attacking native plantings but also different varieties of pine trees, ash trees,
2 Chinese pistachio trees, Raywood ash which are hardy trees. There have been
3 several remediation attempts to get some trees back and some did leaf out again,
4 but there have been over 60 trees along Hadley removed. The pine trees around
5 the dog park are being looked at presently. These mites are also going after ground
6 cover, shrubbery, trees, etc.

7
8 Regarding the lights, Parks and Recreation does not handle electrical, but they will
9 submit a work order to Facilities and they can address that.

10
11 Frank Carril, resident District 4, served on Parks and Recreation Board four years
12 under Mayor Miyagishima and Parks Director Johnson. There are a couple of issues
13 for which he has tried to solve other ways but with no progress, and is asking the
14 Board to help. The first is getting a restroom, a portable one, at the Apodaca Sports
15 Park. There are over 50-75 senior patrons playing pickleball there every day. This
16 was part of a GO Bond project that was very mishandled, with the bottom line of no
17 restroom. He stated that the Parks Director stated there is one 1/8th a mile away
18 on the other side of the park. That is very unacceptable. There are no pathways or
19 sidewalks in Apodaca Park. He is a Vietnam Veteran and also helps American
20 Veterans in Las Cruces that are chaired, to get to the park to try to use the park in
21 different facilities. There are also 4-5 that are pickleball players and others.
22 Currently the handicapped cannot be taken to the park because of several reasons;
23 restrooms, several integrated handicapped issues that have not been addressed.
24 In 2020 he made a formal complaint to City of Las Cruces for which they answered
25 and Mr. Sedillo concurred that there are no handicapped issues at Apodaca Park
26 Sports Facility, pickleball. Well in 2022 he convinced the City that there were some
27 and they took action. They did some very, very minor things; changed a gate from
28 swinging in to swinging out; put a 2-foot by 2-foot pad because it is required, so if
29 you bring a handicapped person up a small sidewalk that you can have a bypass so
30 another person can pass. The one put in was very inadequate, half-mooned shape,
31 and just throwing nothing at nothing. It has been mishandled. There is also an 8.1%
32 grade going uphill there which if you have over 5% it is required a banister. Cannot
33 get handicapped American Vets, disabled, to play there. They have the right to play
34 there, it is a public facility. Las Cruces on their website very readily admits that they
35 concur with the ADA (American With Disabilities Act) of 1990 Title I and II. He stated
36 you cannot put that on the website and not do it.

37
38 The restroom part, it seems like since Mr. Carril has been "hammering" them to get
39 this solved, there is a long-term solution in which the derelict swimming pool that
40 closed with weeds, et. al, next to this facility, houses a lot of homeless at nighttime
41 and the plan is that the piping left from removal of the pool would provide a restroom.
42 He does concur with that. There is no portable restroom. Several patrons had
43 emergencies and had to use trees. This park is the heaviest used outdoor facility in
44 Las Cruces, number 1, with 50-60 people daily. He asked for people to over there
45 between 8:00 and 10:00 a.m. to view that. He will leave a few pictures on how they
46 are being discriminated against, and how to solve it for simple money. The first

1 picture is Provencio-Van Dame Park, which has portable restrooms, he feels it
2 should be permanent. During his time on the PRAB he worked to get permanent
3 restrooms there. The Aqua Center has restrooms, but not at the park. Soldados
4 Park on the other side of Meerscheidt Center for football, again the portable
5 restrooms there. Apodaca Park there is nothing. He feels these are small budget
6 items and that this is totally discrimination because they have complained too much.
7 They asked for handicapped, which they should not have had to ask for. Asked for
8 restrooms which they shouldn't have to ask for. Asked for justice in the GO Bond
9 program under contracting. There were seven public meetings concerning the
10 sports complex at Apodaca. Those meetings, including one at the park, there were
11 100 people at the meeting at the park and various other public meetings, which he
12 feels were a sham. All people gave input into what they felt it should be. When the
13 City wrote what they put on the street for bid, he does have documentation to back
14 up his input and an affidavit that would be accountable in a court of law. The City
15 did it 60 times with GO Bonds. The latest one is for East Mesa for \$6 million. They
16 don't put it out for lowest bidder, or even a statement of work. They just write a
17 general paragraph of what they want to see at the end, which is an RFP, Request
18 for Proposal. He has also had over 20 years contracting with the U.S. Government,
19 working program management on one side, and also in fraud. The City is wasting
20 approximately one-third GO Bond money by putting on the street a paragraph which
21 describes a general subject, RFP, which means "I don't really know what I want.
22 Why don't you people out there look and read my paragraph and come back and tell
23 me what I really need." Then the City goes out under Mr. Sedillo and they have a
24 board and come up and read the people what they have proposals. Then under that
25 circumstance you pick anybody you want, so don't have to pick lowest bidder.

26
27 In Parks and Recreation it was \$1.2 million to fix Hadley Field, Paz Field, Maag
28 Field, Apodaca, and some walking trails. They did not bid it, but put it out for RFP.
29 They put two sentences out there for Apodaca Park, describing after seven public
30 meetings with reams of input that would make that facility correct the way the
31 expertise knows it should be correct. They put it out there because they don't want
32 to really have anyone on the street, in his opinion, to see how much money is going
33 to be spent. In conclusion he read into the record about request for the restrooms
34 and why are they being discriminated against. Next week he will file a discrimination
35 thing with the City. He stated one-third of the GO Bond money is being wasted
36 because the City does not bid for a project.

37
38 Phil Catanach stated there is a GO Bond update later in the agenda.

39
40 Franco Granillo stated there are permanent restrooms on the north side of the park,
41 but they are not close to the pickleball courts. Also looking into the possibility of
42 adding porta potties out there. They have a citywide contract and are currently at
43 the maximum. Also looking at alternate routes to get restrooms there and alternate
44 funding. For porta potty it will have to go to Council to request funding. If they look
45 at existing facilities, they may not be suitable for restroom use because they have
46 to cross the street. There are restrooms in the park, and at Apodaca baseball, but

1 again they would have to cross the street that leads into the park. Regarding the
2 ADA, Public Works would be best to provide information. Sonya and David Sedillo
3 have worked on this for a while. There is correspondence regarding Mr. Carril's
4 inquiries/concerns.

5
6 Gregory Shervanick stated the Young Park renovation has been completed. He
7 believes the GO Bond money that was spent on it was spent poorly. He hopes that
8 SMA Architecture and Highland Enterprise will donate to Parks and Recreation, the
9 City of Las Cruces two wonderful benches on the top area of this tiered watershed
10 device that they have created. I hope it does not come back to the board as a
11 liability. He hopes the board will go to Young Park and look at what the GO Bond
12 money has produced at the picnic shelter.

14 **6. Action Items:**

15
16 **6.1 Crosswalk Art/Hadley - Marina Montoya Administrative Assistant, Parks
17 & Recreation:**

18
19 Marina Montoya, Administrative Assistant, Parks & Recreation provided a
20 PowerPoint. She stated over the last 18 months there has been discussion
21 about the Hadley Complex needing a "wow" factor. They discussed various
22 projects, including the cups now on the fences at Harty, Paz, al the fields at
23 the Hadley Complex. With the conversations there was a need for bringing
24 attention to the crosswalks on Hadley from Solano to Walnut, the "wow" factor
25 for the complex and at the same time improving roadway safety. They came
26 up with asphalt art. There will be four different crosswalks; Location A is on
27 Hadley at the entrance to the Aquatic Center; Location B is at Castaneda
28 Building; Location C is the largest project of the four at the cross of Hadley and
29 Hermosa Street; Location D will be a new crosswalk connecting Paz and Harty
30 Fields. Location A art will consist of floating crosswalks above water and the
31 small Ziggy's floating around in the water. Location B art will play off when
32 trees play wall tile mural over at Castaneda at the entrance, and the crosswalk
33 looks like a ladder going up the tree. Location C art at the four-way
34 intersection, will be Ziggy and kind of showing all the different activities that
35 take place down at the Hadley Complex. With this the only change will be at
36 the left top corner which will be a soccer pattern. Location D art is Ziggy's
37 version of the iconic Abbey Road Picture. This also going to represent the
38 activities. Ziggy will be wearing his basketball shorts, his lifeguard shorts, and
39 then one will have him holding a baseball and bat.

40
41 Vice-Chair Engle asked the longevity on the paint. Marina Montoya stated the
42 artist is thinking it will last about a year as it is the same paint as the street
43 striping paint. Chair McClure asked about the cost, and it will be about \$8,000.
44 The action is actually asking for the Board's support in things like this along
45 the Hadley Complex. Also looking to do some art within Meerscheidt parking
46 lot, over at the Aquatic Center parking lot, and possibly redoing the art over at

1 the Meerscheidt Center, the big wall already has a mural. Also possibly getting
2 some grants, although the last two they tried for they were not approved. Also
3 looking at trying to get the skate park with some asphalt art.
4

5 The money for this project is from last fiscal year. This project has been talked
6 about, had the money, ready to do and it was discussed with federal
7 regulations on crosswalks and also with Traffic Department. They finally got
8 approval with the Public Works Department to go ahead with the project and
9 trying to use the funds before the end of this fiscal year.
10

11 Chair McClure asked about maintenance or upkeep costs. That has not been
12 discussed with the artist. Marina Montoya stated this is a pilot project to see
13 how it will work. The artist stated it should last a year but with the sun in Las
14 Cruces it might be less than that. Also asked why Parks and Recreation is
15 paying for this instead of Public Works. Since Parks and Recreation has the
16 Hadley Complex it is what they wanted as a "wow" factor. Board Member
17 Schuller stated it is a short amount of time for the longevity of the project. It is
18 a great idea, fully support, but she does not think there is everything in place
19 to support it at this moment. Chair McClure asked if this is already set up to
20 do. Preparations have started on Wednesday, and the press release was
21 already announced. Vice-Chair Engle stated it seems a weird item when it is
22 already started. Phil Catanach stated this could be tabled and brought back
23 with the next project. The mural at Meerscheidt will have to go to the Art Board,
24 to this Board and get separate funding. This project had funding from last
25 fiscal year during COVID when they were looking for projects, this was
26 something that fit. Although it did not get done, the funds did get rolled over.
27 They are not expecting the artist to come back and touch it up like some of the
28 other art projects at City facilities as this is a one-time deal. Board Member
29 Schuller stated the only way to put it in as an action item is approval of a pilot
30 program to bring the wow factor to Parks and Recreation. Marina Montoya
31 stated it wasn't only the wow factor but also improving roadway safety for the
32 pedestrians that utilize that complex. Vice-Chair Engle stated the work is
33 already being done so even if tabled it sounds just more like it is a discussion
34 and it would be an action item next year if the Board decided to continue. The
35 artist is Louis Jarmon. He is the person putting together the artists in the mall
36 with kiosks and also on Picacho on the first Friday of every month. The
37 purchase order included his ideas that were drawn for each of the crosswalks,
38 and also included the paint and supplies. The artist has been paid for his
39 sketches and the remainder is for the purchase order. Board Member Schuller
40 stated an approval of enhanced crosswalk area as a safety issue entering into
41 the Hadley Complex, as it is already in process. Specifying it is a onetime
42 enhancement to the safety of the crosswalks is probably the way to approve
43 this. Board Member Schuller move that the Board accept an enhanced
44 crosswalk area along Hadley entering into the Sports Complex using fiscal
45 money from prior year to complete the project for a one-time completion.
46 Seconded by Vice-Chair Engle. Chair McClure also consideration of what kind

1 of artists are in town, getting public participation should be more than "Hey this
2 is going to happen." The press release went out last week.

10 **7. Future Discussion/Task Listing:**

11 **7.1 Velo Cruces - George Pearson, President:**

12
13
14 George Pearson introduced himself, Donald Wilson, and Andrea Holguin from
15 their Board. Velo Cruces, Inc. formed in 2015 is a 501(c)3 non-profit
16 organization. Their mission statement is "Transforming Las Cruces into a
17 great bicycle and pedestrian community." They describe that in three different
18 areas, one is to advocate, to communicate with local county and state officials
19 the need for safe bike/ped facilities which includes the MPO, the City with the
20 Active Transportation Plan, New Mexico DOT at their public meetings. They
21 are working towards bike parking and the updates to the Realize Las Cruces
22 Zoning Code. Also advocated for traffic gardens so there is a place separate
23 from the streets where children, young adults, and adults could learn to ride in
24 traffic when not actually in traffic. Also have an education program, make
25 bicyclists safe and make vehicle drivers aware of bicyclists to all share the
26 road safely. Short message is "Be visible and be predictable." To wear bright
27 clothing when bicycling, at night have a bicycle light which is required by law;
28 be predictable, follow the traffic signals, stop at stop signs; ride in a consistent
29 path and not weaving in and out. Also promote bicycling in general.
30 Participated and helped organize the Mayor's bike ride. Monthly visibility ride
31 they go from the Train Museum up through town over to University near the
32 Starbucks and the idea is to show that bicycles are part of traffic. Also they
33 will have a Father's Day bike ride going from Pioneer Women's Park up to the
34 airport, the Experimental Aircraft Association has a breakfast up there. A
35 couple of programs from Velo Cruces are the Hub Community Bike Shop, and
36 also Everybody Rides with Grace.

37
38 Donald Wilson stated the Hub Community Bike Shop has been around four or
39 five years. They are currently at the Cruces Creatives building between
40 Lohman and Amador and Campo and Church. The idea of the Hub
41 Community Bike Shop is to provide a place for people that live in Las Cruces
42 that have bicycles and want to maintain them, can do that at a very affordable
43 rate. The tools are there, knowledgeable volunteer mechanics, supplies, and
44 also education. During the pandemic not much of that was done because of
45 social distancing, so people would bring the bikes and just leave them with the
46 Shop to be repaired and return later. The other project of the Hub Community

1 Bike Shop is the used bicycle distribution program. This allows any resident
2 of the community to perform six hours of community service at any
3 organization in the community that takes community service, churches, food
4 banks, daycares, etc. They fill out a form, the agency verifies they provided
5 the six hours of community service, and they bring that to the Bike Shop and
6 we give them a serviceable bike, including a light if night traveling, bright yellow
7 vest, and a lock. They make sure the bikes have good innertubes with the slim
8 to help against flats. Through that program they have distributed hundreds of
9 bicycles to people in the community that need them. Most recently they have
10 been working with the Afghan refugees and refugees from other parts of the
11 world that have relocated to Las Cruces and help them get and maintain
12 bicycles.

13
14 Andrea Holguin, the program coordinator for Everybody Rides with Grace,
15 which is umbrellaed under Velo Cruces. They give bikes to kids with special
16 needs, adaptive cycles. These children are identified through schools, local
17 agencies that support children with special needs. These kinds of resources
18 are extremely limited in Las Cruces, El Paso, and Albuquerque. Grace's bike
19 was stolen and Mesilla Marshalls started a fund. The bike was recovered and
20 the monies have been used to start the Everybody Rides with Grace. There
21 will be an adaptive cycle parade on June 4th that begins at the park across
22 from the Community Center in Mesilla, the Mesilla Mayor allowed the use of
23 the restrooms in the Community Center, the Mesilla Marshalls will be leading
24 on a one-mile loop. Safe Routes to School will also be there. They are also
25 educating riders and families of the adaptive bikes to know the rules of the
26 road, avoid common crashes. It would be nice to have bike parks just for the
27 children so they do not have to ride in/with traffic. They did receive funding
28 from the Governor's Quality of Life Grant of almost \$15,000. With this they
29 promised to give away five bikes, and ended up giving way 10. She has to
30 deal with companies not local and the parts are very difficult to acquire now.

31
32 Vice-Chair Engle asked if Grace was able to enjoy the new trails on the EBID
33 laterals. She has not but suggested that might be a fun place to go. With
34 these cycles they need a place to store it, lock it up, and a way to transport it.
35 Chair McClure asked for Velo Cruces to present as she believes there are
36 more collaborations that can happen between Parks and Recreation and the
37 bicycle community. It was mentioned on how cyclists are getting to parks and
38 is that within master plans. There are stipends via Parks and Recreation for
39 hosting things. George Pearson stated he has acquired a stipend in the past
40 and put on a few events. Also to collaborate, he is a league cycling instructor,
41 League of American Bicyclists has a curriculum for how to ride a bicycle safely.
42 There are three or four others in town also qualified. The Youth Board and the
43 Weed and Seed were mentioned for collaborations.

44
45 Robert Nunez mentioned through the teens they purchased 12 mountain bikes
46 over the last two years. They have partnered with Friends of the Organ

1 Mountains. Agrees this is a fabulous idea to get the youth educated and staff.
2 George Pearson mentioned the Safe Routes to School Program in Las Cruces
3 is the strongest program in the state and a model for the country, and so Velo
4 Cruces works closely with them.
5

6 **7.2 Dog Park Update - Franco Granillo, Parks Administrator, Parks &**
7 **Recreation:**
8

9 Franco Granillo stated they are in the process of looking at the trees that were
10 mentioned by the member of the public, but they have had some severe issues
11 along the Hadley corridor with the trees. They took out roughly 65-70 trees,
12 but they have been replaced with ornamentals and plants that will grow 10-15
13 feet but will provide color. The pine trees do have an issue and they believe it
14 is the same mite they have sent samples to be looked at. He can have results
15 next meeting or an e-mail, whichever the Board prefers.
16

17 Mr. Armstrong came last month and discussed reestablishing the quarterly
18 meetings. One was put on the calendar and Mr. Armstrong e-mails after the
19 fact and let staff know he did not see the invite. Those will continue to be
20 scheduled. Some of the discussion items were the proposed dog park rules.
21 Mr. Armstrong had discussed the current dog park rules and that they needed
22 to be more substantial, more teeth in them, and more support from Codes.
23 Franco Granillo stated they reviewed the old dog park rules with staff,
24 management, and legal. Jamey Rickman the former community liaison with
25 Council and the residents helped a lot. He stated once the City ordinances
26 that are being reviewed, once the Animal Control portion is reviewed and
27 passed, the dog park rules will pass them as well. We can also look forward
28 to move forward with the current proposed rules before they become an
29 ordinance and then get something on the books for upcoming facilities. For
30 public input they would have three meetings, one in each area; Burn Lake, the
31 Animal Shelter area, and the current Las Cruces Dog Park to take public input.
32 Mr. Armstrong had mentioned there were no doggy waste bag removers, but
33 that was checked the next day and the boxes were full and 80 bags tied up
34 along the fences where people could use them. The light that was brought up
35 by a member of the public, Facilities will be consulted for that.
36

37 **7.3 On-Line Registration Update - Franco Granillo, Parks Administrator,**
38 **Parks & Recreation:**
39

40 Frank Granillo stated he knows that there seems to be a long wait and
41 questions about the registration that took place last month at Meerscheidt. His
42 portion is the getting the on-line program up and running. Staff has worked
43 very hard with the new program, called RecTrac. This provides a sporting
44 module, class counts, on-line registration, permitting for the parks, a lot of
45 functions that eTRAC provided, the previous program, but RecTrac is different
46 and at a higher level. His current issue with on-line registrations is, when

1 someone registers in the programs they have to pay, and the credit card
2 function is not working properly with treasury, and treasury in this case does
3 get the final say on what they want to see. Files from RecTrac have been sent
4 to have treasury test them but there are a lot of formatting issues. One of the
5 issues is determining between a cash payment, credit card payment, or a
6 check. Treasury needs to see the property payment and how it was done.
7 Another issue is formatting. RecTrac files are not matching with Munis files.
8 The inhouse staff person has been running reports to compare and see where
9 the errors are, why it cannot differentiate between the various payment
10 methods. Right now they are waiting to see what kind of file or set up can be
11 used for treasury's programming software to read the RecTrac software.
12

13 Board Member Schuller about receiving checks and cash when that is not on-
14 line. Franco Granillo stated at the end of the day with reconciliation the report
15 does not show what type of payment method was received. Board Member
16 Schuller also asked about if there were kiosks or plans for such to free up
17 some manpower for those without cell phones. Franco Granillo stated staff is
18 already working on a kiosk process which will have to be in conjunction with
19 Facilities for the electrical and ADA compliance. Possibly a kiosk in the
20 Aquatic Center.
21

22 Further discussion on RecTrac and Munis and them not functioning together.
23 There may be some functions of Munis that have not been paid for. Munis is
24 a citywide software, assets, inventory, and financials, right now it is not able to
25 function for a recreation department that takes permits, different programs on
26 a daily basis, etc. Sonya Delgado, Parks and Recreation Director stated that
27 Munis had a piece that could be done with Parks and Recreation and asked
28 Las Cruces to be the guinea pig, but we are way too big to be a guinea pig and
29 start from ground zero. eTRAC had an issue talking with Munis so it was done
30 by hand and the Parks department has outgrown that. RecTrac was supposed
31 to be able to talk with Munis, all departments were on board, but now having
32 this issue. It is being worked by all. Frank Granillo stated cash payments
33 received have to be reconciled that same day. With the current errors they
34 would only be able to reconcile once the errors are solved, putting Parks and
35 Recreation in violation of own protocols. Chair McClure stated she had waited
36 two hours to sign up her children and that is just too much.
37

38 **7.4 Butterfield Shooting Range Update - Frank Granillo, Parks Administrator,** 39 **Parks & Recreation; David Sedillo, Director, Public Works:** 40

41 Franco Granillo stated that Mr. Pruitt at the last meeting discussing the entry
42 road into Butterfield Shooting Range. Sonya Delgado did give Mr. Pruitt her
43 business card at the last meeting and he then reached out to her for his
44 concerns. Franco Granillo has spoken to him four or five times since the last
45 meeting and Mr. Pruitt has been every responsive and appreciates the
46 updates. Franco Granillo met with Public Works to determine a timeline of

1 what they could do. Today was the first day they were out there and they were
2 able to clean the work site very well and back filled potholes. Since there were
3 so many they have asked for another day of maintenance. Parks and
4 Recreation is working with BLM to acquire the road, acquire the right-of-way
5 as it is not the City's right now. There is a work plan for short term and long-
6 term care of the road and repair. The long-term fix has still not been decided
7 due to needing more information after more study at the Range.
8

9 **7.5 GO Bond Project Update - Sreedevi Bhathala Mohanraj, Architectural**
10 **Project Manager, Public Works:**

11
12 Jennifer Morrow, Public Works Engineering Administrator gave a PowerPoint
13 presentation. First discussing the Hadley Rec Complex started in October
14 2020 and finished last August. Also the Parks and Sports Courts, started in
15 October 2020 and is essentially complete and the last item was at Young Park
16 with some erosion control issues which were worked with the engineer and the
17 contractor and put in small retaining wall and some erosion control measures.
18 Fourhills subdivision, and Lions Park. A list of all the parks that had been
19 worked on were displayed; Klein Park, Hillrise, Fourhills, Papen, Benavidez,
20 Lions, and Apodaca, Young Park, and Metro Verde and the desert trails
21 system. Also at the bottom of the slide was the extra work for Young Park with
22 the erosion control. Also Unidad Park, included drone aerials. Precon was
23 January this year and stated construction soon after. A 100% of demolition is
24 done and installing the play equipment, splash pad, and restroom. There have
25 been supply chain issues and so the due date has been extended from
26 June/July to closer to September. The East Mesa Rec Center, started phase
27 1 in February which included pickleball courts, soccer fields, baseball fields,
28 and a general park area with a playground. The GO Bond portion of it will be
29 done at the end of this year which is basically earthwork and everything except
30 for the landscaping which was put into ARPA funding for project completion to
31 be Spring 2023. Dog Parks, Rinconada, survey is about 80% complete, the
32 site concrete is complete, chain link fence is being installed. They add
33 restrooms with the ARPA funding. At Burn Lake they are working on that with
34 the irrigation system and chain link fence, to be completed around September
35 of this year. The walking, jogging, and biking trails are pretty much complete.
36 There are a few items to be cleaned up with EBID and some homeowners for
37 permitting for fencing to be comfortable with the public at the back of their
38 houses. Also some supply chain issues, mostly furnishings for the Las Cruces
39 Trail, benches, trash receptacles. This should all be done by early to mid-
40 September of this year. Mesilla Drain 100% complete. Las Cruces Drain has
41 some punch list items. The Armijo Drain is having some fencing put on.
42

43 Vice-Chair Engle asked about a bad monsoon and the erosion control fails at
44 Young Park and who would pay. An act of God or nature is the owner's
45 responsible. If it was a standard monsoon, the erosion control is designed for
46 100 year storm, but the actual definition of the storm will determine who is

1 responsible.

2
3 **7.6 New 50-Meter Community Pool Update - Sreedevi Bhathala Mohanraj,**
4 **Architectural Project Manager, Public Works:**

5
6 Jennifer Morrow stated the groundbreaking was last July with notice to
7 proceed. She saw it today and it looks great. The construction budget is \$17
8 million, and added almost another half million with the ARPA funds. They are
9 almost halfway don't at this time. All underground utilities are done, all the
10 pool excavation, plumbing rough in, the structural steel work was being welded
11 today, exterior shell is about 80%. Drone photos were shared. Some of the
12 painting has been done.

13
14 Phil Catanach wanted to let the Board know as the Regional Aquatic Center
15 opens in January 2023, Frenger Pool will close. Board Member Schuller also
16 brought up the repurpose of Frenger Pool if possible. Sonya Delgado stated
17 with the master plans that came forward with Frenger, as it goes to Council it
18 will be the next step. Once the master plan is finalized, in each it talks about
19 doing something different with the pool, and looks like a splash pad of some
20 sort.

21
22 **7.7 Gomez Park/Cricket - Steve Pacheco, Senior Engineer, Public Works:**

23
24 Sonya Delgado mentioned that at the last meeting a group came to discuss
25 cricket. They had asked for the area to be smoothed out, easier for them to
26 make their game easier. They do play regularly and it is a great space for
27 them. One of the issues is that first and foremost that is a pond, so it has to
28 keep its integrity and part of that dome type shape.

29
30 Jennifer Morrow stated the issues with areas that are designed to hold
31 stormwater they have to ensure is that the volume and storage is not changed,
32 no impervious material that is utilized in the pond to ensure the water
33 percolates out. The outlet structure needs to be protected at all times. Ensure
34 to not remove a lot of the vegetation. Also if the vegetation starts to die off,
35 and if it has a good root system when it dies off it will leave "potholes." Also
36 FEMA criteria has to be met. Also elevation changes could affect Parks and
37 Recreations irrigation.

38
39 Sonya Delgado stated she will have to work with Public Works as they would
40 have to issue a letter to FEMA, and see if that is even an option. Vice-Chair
41 Engle stated the short term answer is that they are going to have to play the
42 way it is. Sonya Delgado stated yes for the next couple of months as she does
43 not know the process and if it will be granted. When it rains both Gomez and
44 Frenger fill up, like lakes, with people asking to put boats out there, which is
45 not allowed. Many of the older facilities are dual purpose, as they are a pond
46 and a park. The park portion is really only up on the high sides which is around

1 the edge. At this time Parks and Recreation is not accepting a pond and a
2 park together as a lot of space is lost. Chair McClure asked if there were
3 notices saying that that area is a pond. Board Member Schuller stated it
4 should be noted to be drainage and a not a pond as people will expect water.
5 Also have Public Works look into the process of regrading. And then possibly
6 approach FEMA about reissuing as it is a flood zone. And signs indicating this
7 is a drainage facility.
8

9 **7.8 4th of July Update - Phil Catanach, Recreation Administrator, Parks &**
10 **Recreation:**

11
12 Phillip Catanach stated they are teaming up with NMSU again to hold the 4th
13 of July Celebration at the Pat Lou Sisbarro Park on the 4th of July on the
14 Monday. The Sunday will be the Electric Light Parade at 9:00, an electric 5K
15 and fun run at 7:30. Starting to get entries for the parade, and the theme this
16 year is Patriot Spirit and American Dream. As this is an election year they
17 figure on having many floats, the average is 40-60 and with all the vehicles,
18 each float can have up to 15 cars or 20 cars if it is a car club. The parade will
19 last a bit more than an hour. This year we will have five time Grammy winner
20 Raul Malo of the Mavericks leading the show, and then the Plain White T's to
21 headline. The concert will start at 6:00 and the Plain White T's will come on at
22 8:00. Scheduled for fireworks presentation right now. Even with the all the
23 fires they believe the Governor will allow for municipalities to have firework
24 shows as professional firework shows are very safe, strict blast zone, fire
25 department and safety personnel everywhere to make sure that nothing
26 happens. There are contingencies if things are cancelled. Advertisements will
27 begin next week, on buses, radio, Bulletin, and Las Cruces Sun News. This
28 is the biggest event the City puts on. The Mother's day event was quite
29 successful this year.
30

31 **7.9 Team Up to Clean Up Updates - Robert Nunez, Youth Services**
32 **Administrator, Parks & Recreation:**

33
34 Robert Nunez, Youth Services Administrator for Parks and Recreation, stated
35 last month they had their first district Team Up to Clean Up event for District 6.
36 There were approximately 50 new volunteers, and an additional 30 that have
37 been within the system and either adopted spots or been involved in the
38 programs. They collected approximately two tons of trash throughout the
39 district. There were three trash containers: one at the East Mesa Swimming
40 Pool off of Reynolds, the old T-Time of Del Rey, Telshor, Northrise, and lastly
41 on the south side near the neighborhood Walmart. There are commercial bins
42 that are out there which are open to any resident in the community to be able
43 to dump trash at no cost. During the pandemic there was a major clean up
44 and everybody went out there, and it was a lot overwhelming. Staff is stationed
45 there and solid waste also picks them up at the end of program. They will send
46 everyone the remaining schedule for the year, and District 5 is the next location

1 in June. Working closely with Community Outreach department to get the
2 word out for District 5, Councilor Corran.
3

4 **7.10 Parks & Recreation Project Updates - Catherine Mathews, Landscape**
5 **Architect, Parks & Recreation:**
6

7 Sonya Delgado stated that Catherine Mathews was still in a meeting for the
8 Gallagher Park. Catherine Mathews has her update sheet with her. Sonya
9 Delgado did state that they are working with NMDOT and EBID to get
10 permission to finish up the RTP Trail with the Las Cruces Lateral. Catherine
11 Mathews does have a meeting with EBID on June 10th. This has been a
12 struggle and a challenge with EBID, particularly with the GO Bond trails
13 because there are a lot of farmers and landowners/homeowners who do not
14 want that trail behind them. Moving forward this will be a challenge in trying to
15 expand some of the laterals. They are already being utilized though.
16

17 **7.11 Gallagher Park Renovations Update - Catherine Mathews, Landscape**
18 **Architect, Parks & Recreation:**
19

20 Sonya Delgado showed a PowerPoint on the Gallagher Park improvements.
21 It is located on West Gallagher Avenue. A \$150,000 was received from
22 Council to help with some improvements. The first public meeting was April,
23 and tonight was the second. Today they were to make some choices. They
24 wanted gathering spaces for families, shaded picnic tables, and other shaded
25 areas, game places, structures to play on for children. It is not a very large
26 space. Tonight the meeting was to discuss which elements they really wanted
27 to have. A \$150,000 is not a lot for park improvements so there were some
28 decisions to be made. Also talked about rubberized safety surfacing for the
29 swing. At present there is a swing and a slide, and they were discussing
30 getting new ones which would require new safety surfacing which is also
31 expensive. They also wanted another covered shaded area what was open
32 space that people can use and bring their own chairs. Also pet pickup boxes
33 with the bags. And game tables with chairs. Also some sustainable features
34 as well from stormwater and harvesting and solar power for lighting. The
35 question was asked if another \$150,000 would be guaranteed for next fiscal
36 year, which was explained that that is not a guarantee, but put it into the
37 budget, but may not get funded. Other types of funding opportunities were
38 discussed, State Legislative grants, etc. The residents asked about fund
39 raising and it was explained there are entities that do some minor fund raising
40 and it does help leverage when they approach State Legislators and/or City
41 Council. They did like the big jungle gym and that would it with the safety
42 surface, maybe add some chairs or benches, but that idea was dropped in
43 favor of again just a swing or slide. The City does have an agreement with
44 Friends of Gallagher Park and they are adopting that park and have been
45 doing so for the last two years. The residents pulled the weeds by hand as
46 Parks and Recreation does not spray that park. The neighborhood does enjoy

1 that park space so Parks and Recreation are trying to help improve it.

2
3 **7.12 Las Cruces Public School Agreement - High Noon Soccer Fields (1-5) -**
4 **Sonya Delgado, Director, Parks & Recreation:**

5
6 Sonya Delgado stated the agreement is with LCPS. She spoke with the lawyer
7 today and he still has it. He might have a couple of questions but that will go
8 back to City Legal. He is probably going to have to go to the school board and
9 that is unknown timing.

10
11 **8. Staff Member Comments:**

12
13 Robert Nunez, Keep Las Cruces Beautiful, they are getting out the stipends for
14 cleanups. There were 22 this fiscal year and that is winding down with various clubs,
15 schools, private groups, Boy Scouts, NMSU clubs. Adopt-a-Spot, we added another
16 four new groups this last month. Graffiti abatement, there is an increase in graffiti
17 which is targeting the electric boxes and the light poles. A crew of two are out
18 working eight hours a day trying to remove that, which then also creates a canvas
19 for them to return. They are looking forward to FY23 grant notification. They
20 submitted the application last month and should be hearing back hopefully by the
21 end of June.

22
23 Out of school time, school has finished as of yesterday. We are prepping for a very
24 short summer, approximately 26 days for the summer program. Summer recreation
25 starts on Tuesday and Weed and Seed and Teens start on June 1st, Wednesday
26 and 8:00 to 5:00 in all programs. All programs have filled up, with a waiting list of
27 approximately 75-80 families/kids in the community that need the program or would
28 like to get in the program. The issue right now is staffing. They are advertising, and
29 working with temp services to acquire staff. They will be getting student interns
30 through Doña Ana County that will be of assistance but they will be shadowing a
31 staff member throughout the day. It is a \$15 an hour job and they will look at
32 recruitment.

33
34 Youth development and diversion, winding down the FY22 grant. CYFD sent the
35 agreement for next fiscal year, so working closely the grants office. June 21st going
36 forward for YCC mural rehab and community forestry projects. This will be an
37 opportunity to hire 15 youth this summer until December 31st to get the two projects
38 completed.

39
40 Chair McClure stated \$15 was good but \$16-17 would be better. Robert Nunez
41 stated the City did the adjustments to minimum wage going from \$10.50 to \$15.
42 They are looking for creative ideas to bring people onboard. Also working with
43 NMSU with the work study program.

1 Franco Granillo stated they have a lot of routine maintenance work. The community
2 forestry staff did make their goal and planted over 250 trees this year. Planting
3 slows down with the heat of the season but will pick up again in cooler weather.
4

5 Phillip Catanach stated Little Hoopsters basketball ended this last weekend. Youth
6 Basketball Tournament ends this next week. Cheerleading program just ended this
7 week. Youth Soccer starting May 28th, and T-ball starting June 4th. They ended
8 up with over 450 kids for the two sports. Adult basketball, doing a mini league and
9 it begins on May 31st and there are 28 teams for that. Also doing registration for
10 Youth Volleyball and that league is about full, possibly room for one more team.
11 FitLot Grant that was started on the FitLot outdoor fitness center at Benavidez
12 Center and we have hit the goal of at least 6 students for each class as the grant
13 requires. To check it out go to Eventbrite and register to take the classes. This
14 weekend starts the Music in the Park series with Mayor's Jazz Fest with Paula
15 Atherton, Sunday, 6:00 at the Plaza de Las Cruces. Next week Music in the Park
16 series with music every Sunday until August 28th. The first Sunday at Young Park
17 is the Pistoleros and Mariachi Aguilas and start at 7:00. On June 1st start Lift Up
18 Las Cruces program, bringing activities to Apodaca Park which will start with family
19 game nights on Thursday night June 1st and then kick into Movies in the Park and
20 the first movie is June 11th which will be Encanto. This Monday is free swim day at
21 the outdoor pools open this weekend as do the splash pads. The regional aquatic
22 center hit capacity yesterday.
23

24 Sonya Delgado stated that at Young Park Pond there is training in mid-June with
25 New Mexico Game and Fish. Once that is done, then solidify how the pond will get
26 stocked, when and with what species and tonnage, then it will get stocked first week
27 in July with catfish. Currently the pond is doing great. Utilities put in aerators and
28 that are working great. They were also able to disc golf and they are looking at
29 behind the Las Cruces Dam. There is a PO in place and then some insurance
30 documents and when that finishes up then a notice will be received to proceed and
31 move forward. It will be a nine holes disc golf, and hopefully up and running in early
32 fall, maybe end of summer. There are also some safety tips going on social media
33 pages regarding summer care, being out in the hot sun and working, know who is
34 around, buddy up, being around water, etc. Also in the process of purchasing the
35 bilingual book-walks. Currently have three of them. And working with the library to
36 have a program with that as well. Still finalizing the spaces for them.
37

38 Sonya Delgado stated next month she will be giving a presentation on the budget
39 to include CIP, things that were approved by City Council, and the strategic plan.
40 The strategic plan still needs approval. Also discussing CAPRA accreditation
41 through National Recreation and Park Association, the process, the role the Board
42 has with regards to that. The CIAC, Capital Improvement Advisory Committee
43 received a tour from Parks and Recreation and they were most interested in the
44 number of people that work on the projects as there are quite a few projects. There
45 is a three person team.
46

1 Chair McClure asked that once they have a full complement of the Board she would
2 like to do a tour for the Board also.

3
4 Sonya Delgado also mentioned an ADA walk through on Tuesday, 31st with Ms.
5 Hope Reed from the New Mexico Governor's Commission on Disabilities. This
6 request came from Mr. Frank Carril who sent an e-mail to the state. He wants a tour
7 of Apodaca Pickleball courts, Paz, and Lions. With regards to Paz and Lions, she
8 is not sure what he is wanting to look at, but Public Works Director, David Sedillo;
9 Community Development Director, Larry Nichols; and Sonya will be there. She did
10 say the facilities do meet the requirements for ADA access. With all things there
11 are different levels; minimum, medium, and the "Cadillac." Parks and Recreation is
12 requesting additional funding to assist with the restroom issue brought up earlier in
13 public comment. Board Member Schuller asked about the porta potties in the City,
14 asked if the vendor is responsible for maintenance, and how often. Franco Granillo
15 stated their contract is for anywhere there are not permanent restrooms on sports
16 facilities, or when restrooms are shut down. It is not made for an entire park system.
17 The vendor supplies cleanings on the amount the City requests, usually twice a day.
18 The porta potties are rented for \$85 each depend on ADA or not, but cleanings cost
19 \$15-25 each time. This ends up being a big bill. They would have to go to Council
20 to increase the PO or ask for separate funding for another vendor, which would be
21 difficult as one is on contract. This vendor does do tournaments, sporting areas, but
22 this is not something he is used to and he has other work. There are permanent
23 restrooms near the pickleball courts, in that park location, they have to cross the
24 street. There is a specific path that is ADA accessible to the current restrooms at
25 Apodaca Park.

26
27 **9. Board Member Comments:**

28
29 Board Member Schuller gave kudos for the Music in the Park and the Movies in the
30 Park as her friend just moved down and Albuquerque does not offer these. Vice-
31 Chair Engle mentioned the Mother's Day Concert and his father-in-law liked it. It
32 seems like there were some people using 1,000 lbs. motorcycles on the brand new
33 trail system. Sonya Delgado let Codes and PD know with that issue. Motorized has
34 to be on the street, not sidewalk or paths. And there is signage for no motorized on
35 paths.

36
37 Chair McClure asked about the hiking program. Sonya Delgado stated this was just
38 discussed and they are looking to see to partner up with Friends of Organ Mountain
39 to assist with the adult and senior hiking programs. The individual that was the lead
40 on that program is no longer with the team. Chair McClure mentioned Ocotillo
41 Hikers. It is a senior focused group with a website, but hike at your own risk.

42
43 Chair McClure mentioned Veterans Memorial Park and also a constituent that was
44 asking about signage to not climb things. Sonya Delgado stated they are talking
45 with the Veterans Advisory Board and they did ask for update on some signs. Also
46 they are asking that the name be changed, remove Park from the name, and only

1 have Veterans Memorial. It will change the context of that area. Also some
2 additional things they would like to do with that space. They have requested to
3 come to this Board probably next month and working with Larry Nichols from
4 Community Development who is the liaison for the Veterans Advisory Board. Chair
5 McClure also asked about the master plan with growth of parking and possibly
6 extension into sort of what is now desert land. Sonya Delgado said that is still
7 moving forward, currently at about 90% on the parking lot. They will need to find
8 funding. The parking lot is \$2 million, Parks has about \$500,000, and so they need
9 the remainder. City Council and the City Manager have been approached and they
10 are working through that process. No final decisions have been made yet. There
11 is talk to remove the playground at that site.

12
13 Chair McClure stated she was at the April 30, 2022 Lil Sluggers Baseball and Youth
14 Outdoor Soccer registration with some 400 people and it was disappointing. Did not
15 seem to be management of how the people were organized. Inside it was chaos
16 and the indoor space was not being used accurately. It should not have been that
17 long of a wait or such a mess. Mr. Catanach did reply that they did not anticipate
18 the nearly 400 people that came to sign up.

19
20 **10. Adjournment:**

21
22 Board Member Schuller moved to adjourn, seconded by Vice-Chair Engle.

28 Motion carried unanimously.
29

30 **5. Public Participation:**
31

32 There was none.
33

34 **6. Action Items:**
35

36 **6.1 Renaming Veteran's Memorial Park – Rod Gajewski, Veteran's Advisory**
37 **Board Vice-Chair:**
38

39 Larry Nichols, Community Development Director recognized members of the
40 Veteran's Advisory Board in the audience, Rod Gajewski, Hubert Gay, and
41 James Turner. They are bringing a special use designation and naming of the
42 Veteran's Memorial Park. The City Manager Policy 3.3 which was handed to
43 the Board requires certain number items that are required for this to be
44 considered, and those requirements have been fulfilled, specifically the name
45 that is being proposed, the reason for the proposal, and also accomplishment
46 of two goals for protecting and providing the Veteran's Remembrance.

1
2 Rod Gajewski stated one of the things they try to do with Veteran's Memorial
3 Park is it is a memorial. There has been damage to the park in 2018, a running
4 group got a permit and ran through and marked up the grass. Also damage to
5 the helicopter. Mr. Granillo had planted some plants next to the Purple Heart
6 Monument and within two weeks they were stolen. Mr. Gajewski is a Purple
7 Heart Veteran. There has been other damage to the park. Their park is a
8 preeminent park. They have a ladies monument that doesn't rival, it is better
9 than one in Washington, D.C., for which he has been to the one in Washington,
10 D.C. It is better than the one in Albuquerque. The park is a memorial to those
11 who have served and those who have fallen.
12

13 The park was dedicated in the May 1999 by City Ordinance. The City has a
14 Park Master Plan that was adopted in 2019 with a Special Use Park category,
15 Chapter 2, Section 1. It was constructed by the Las Cruces Home Builders
16 Association. It is a 9+ acre memorial park. It has a Garrison Flag Plaza, the
17 Monument Walkway, and it consists of 11 Veteran Monuments. A listing of the
18 monuments was shown. Whenever there is a request for a monument to be
19 added, this would go before the Veteran's Advisory Board who will look at the
20 viability, location, and vote on it. They try to make the monuments appropriate
21 to what is representative of our community also.
22

23 There is a Parks Master Plan and in the Special Use category is where this
24 park falls under. There are other special use parks within the City. This is
25 about giving the park it's proper memorialization, no limiting the neighborhood.
26 Groups will have quinceañeras and put tape on the pergolas and then the City
27 staff has to remove the tape, and in taking the tape down it peels the paint
28 down. A couple of years ago the Purple Heart painted the pergolas and they
29 currently look they have not been painted because they have been damaged.
30 There is football and soccer in both of the grass areas. Parking is done
31 haphazardly. They are trying to get the park to its designation as a special use
32 park as per the City's Park Master Plan.
33

34 The park is currently 9-plus acres, but the 5.2 acres next was recently
35 acquired. The plan is for the 5.2 acres for parking upon acquisition of funding.
36 They do have events there, The Run for the Wall, the Welcome Home Vietnam
37 Veterans, on Memorial Day they have the candle lighting ceremony honoring
38 the 204 Southern New Mexicans who has fallen in combat. At the moment
39 when there are large events people are parking on the street. People tend to
40 speed.
41

42 The naming criteria for a City facility is to complete the City Manager policy
43 form 3 which has been done which may be submitted by an individual or a
44 group. In this case in a motion last month at the Veteran's Advisory Board,
45 and the signed petition was given to the Board, they are the group that is
46 submitting the request for the name change. Also a written statement

1 indicating request for naming modification. The reasons are stated in the
2 packet the Board received. The review process is to submit the form to Parks
3 and Recreation Advisory Board for review, staff check for duplication or conflict
4 with existing facility names, the City Manager considers if the request is to be
5 considered and he determines if the name request will be considered by City
6 Council, and City Council by a vote of four or more at a formal City Council
7 meeting to grant the naming request or deny it.
8

9 Veteran's Memorial Park does not emphasize the significance of a monument,
10 sacred setting on remembrance of Veterans service, creates an understanding
11 of mixed use, memorial versus recreation. Primary utilization is for Veterans
12 events and functions. There are 23 garrison flag dates per year, Memorial
13 Day, Veteran's Day, Armed Forces Day, and Run to the Wall, and also the
14 Welcome Home Vietnam which has been done for 10 years now. The
15 secondary utilization is for citizens park activity, walking, relaxation, family
16 sized outdoor activities. They are no trying to stop those, but trying to
17 memorialize the monuments and the respect. The Master Plan allows for the
18 parking lot expansion, additional restrooms, parking lot landscaping, parking
19 lot lighting, potential veterans cemetery. The City Manager brought up that in
20 Utah they have done cemeteries. The lower grass area in the park has that
21 potential. There is currently not a veterans cemetery in Las Cruces, and a
22 veteran would have to go to Fort Bayard. Down the road the monument
23 walkway expansion, additional security cameras. The recently installed
24 cameras and the lighting has helped immensely towards the reduction and
25 problematics with the park.
26

27 Larry Nichols stated that what is being requested is in the Master Plan which
28 was adopted by the City Council. And this would be a clarification for the
29 citizenry to know that that particular park, along with some of the other special
30 use parks, are available to them.
31

32 ROD GAJEWSKI SHARED WITH THE BOARD SOME PICTURES ON HIS
33 CELL PHONE. Larry Nichols stated they will get the pictures to be able to
34 share with the Board. Rod Gajewski stated these pictures have all been
35 shared with the City Manager.
36

37 Rod Gajewski stated people are to get a permit for taping on the pergola and
38 that to do that people had to have ladders over 8 feet to do such and so the
39 Parks and Rec people are having trouble removing it.
40

41 Board Member Schuller asked for clarification on regular park versus special
42 use park, and how Veteran's is established with the parties and/or practices.
43 Franco Granillo stated the difference between Veteran's Park and other park,
44 it is basically considered a memorial which is a destination park for people that
45 want to have functions there regarding the military. Young Park is a heavily
46 used park in the City as is Apodaca Park, but there are no memorials. Young

1 Park and Apodaca are first come, first serve use, but you do have permit them
2 for major events. Permits are required in parks for events, provide insurance.
3 At Veteran's Park they do some of the same events, but as Mr. Gajewski
4 mentioned they do put up banners, fliers and things on the pergola and his
5 staff is not allowed to go higher than eight feet, based on discussions with the
6 union and other departments. The Facilities Department has lifts and ladders
7 to go higher. Veteran's Park is a public park, it is used just like Young and
8 Apodaca, the difference is the memorials and the intended use for that park
9 versus other parks which are first come, first serve for anybody, but still
10 necessitating permitting for larger events. One issue is with the athletic fields,
11 during this time of the year people are playing leagues and not practicing. All
12 of the sports fields are fenced in and set up for sanction play are being used.
13 Any athletic group will try and find open space anywhere; parks, the university,
14 or renting fields. They are having daily practices at Veteran's Park on the field
15 on the west end, soccer, baseball, rugby. The issues Parks sees, they do not
16 confine themselves to the lower area, they will get on the top turf area where
17 the wall is some kids climb on the wall. These would be the things the
18 Veteran's group is trying to eliminate, the handling of the memorial. It has been
19 discussed if the park did change its use, there could be a Veteran's
20 ambassador that takes children throughout the park and let's them know what
21 the memorials are for, who served and when.

22
23 Rod Gajewski stated 13 organizations are represented by the Veteran's
24 Advisory Board. If one of the group is in the park and someone is looking, they
25 are well versed in what the things that go on and why the things are there.
26 Johnny's Cactus has significantly reverence of the fact that John Risner
27 planted the sprig of cactus in his front yard and said to his sister they will
28 transplant it when he gets home, but he never came home alive. Currently
29 there are over 100 communities nationwide that have sprigs of that cactus.

30
31 Athletes that come park head in and block all the spaces, disabled and
32 otherwise, seeming not to care. They are trying to get a reverence to the park.

33
34 Board Member Schuller asked how the monitoring with this proposal would
35 work as it seems the Veteran's Board wants to keep it open to the
36 neighborhood communities and able to utilize it as recreational portion. Rod
37 Gajewski stated additional signage, and when the word gets out people will
38 start to adhere. But he agreed there will be a significant challenge. Chair
39 McClure had heard from constituents with the same question about how does
40 respect get shown since it is a recreational space too. Her concern is that it
41 will not create an understanding of mixed use. An expansion upon the name
42 as it stands might need to be considered, such as Veteran's Memorial Park
43 and Public Park to make that delineation very clear. At this point it would be
44 hard to stave off some of Mr. Gajewski's concerns with a shortening of the
45 name. Interesting to see the special use and the Board was not aware of the
46 special use so that is something the Board would also need to consider. Chair

1 McClure also asked if there had been a public hearing. Rod Gajewski stated
2 they had not had a public hearing and it has not been a requirement. He
3 mentioned that when it goes before the City Council that would entail a public
4 hearing. He mentioned in Doña Ana County there are 80-some-hundred
5 veterans and they will be in force to state their position. The Civilian Based
6 Outpatient Clinic on Del Rey has grown greatly, and are already in the process
7 of expanding that facility. The veteran community is growing here. Looking
8 for respect to the park. There are people that ride bicycles across the grass
9 area in the front. There are small signs on the wall that say No Roller skating,
10 but people do it, and it needs to stop.

11
12 Chair McClure stated the expansion too because of the Master Plan is going
13 to kind of help that delineation in space, one side, that is going to be much
14 more focused on the memorial, and the five acres is going to be a little bit more
15 perhaps recreational, perhaps parking. Rod Gajewski stated the five acres is
16 going to provide 161 parking spaces. Chair McClure also mentioned walking
17 areas that will pull away some of the disturbances that are happening in the
18 park. There might be discussion we can have about moving some of the more,
19 bar-b-que, etc., into that other portion. That is not determined until that is
20 actually is created. It might be a good faith effort to actually have a public
21 meeting before the name change happens to get the input of what the people
22 are thinking in that space. Family members might be aware of who is doing
23 the graffiti.

24
25 Also, is this damage being reported to LCPD and could those reports be
26 acquired for the record? Rod Gajewski stated they are and had been provided
27 to the City Manager. He mentioned that the prosecution for the damage to the
28 helicopter was dropped. But the Veterans did save the City money by going
29 to the boneyard at White Sands Missile Range and get some of the parts for
30 the helicopter. The helicopter would have cost \$30,000 to fix, but had donated
31 labor from White Sands. The City Manager has the District Attorney's file on
32 the helicopter damage, and pictures of the damage in 2018 done to the grass,
33 and also the current issue with the taping of things. There is currently not
34 enough signage, and more prominent signage. There are people who do not
35 respect any of the parks, but this park has a nature of respect to the veterans
36 of the community and the 204 who have died and over 8,000 who are alive
37 and still here.

38
39 Chair McClure stated that the Board has been invested in Veteran's Memorial
40 Park. They are looking to expand what they honor at the park. And it has
41 been in consideration for a while how to balance not just the respectful nature
42 but also the fact of what the veterans died for. There is an educational
43 opportunity to bring children there, have family time, and also go and talk about
44 this is history.

1 The playground was brought up. Mr. Gajewski stated in the Master Plan it
2 goes, it is out. There is an information building to be there, additional
3 restrooms. It would be hard to explain to the citizens that use that playground
4 but it is a special use park. The War Dog park was brought before the
5 Veteran's Advisory Board by Ms. Zahler. They have monuments appropriate
6 to significant number of veterans who have participated in those items. There
7 are only four people in New Mexico that trained and did groundwork as War
8 Dogs, and only one is alive here in Las Cruces. And he does not want a War
9 Dogs monument. The last five monuments installed in the park were raised
10 by community efforts by Richard Lewis, who recently passed. He and his
11 group raised the money to pay for the monuments. There are quite a number
12 of specialities and they could over do it, but they don't. They have over 250
13 Purple Heart recipients, 65 members are active members within their chapter.
14 There are a significant number of Vietnam Veterans that reside in the City and
15 county.

16
17 Chair McClure asked what he would tell the neighborhood residents that use
18 the playground. Rod Gajewski stated the Master Plan states that would go
19 away. He mentioned that if you entered or left the service as a resident of
20 Doña Ana County and to the wall committee you present your DD214 and then
21 you can be on that wall. Sgt. First Class Ray Rodriguez was the 204th resident
22 who was killed in Afghanistan.

23
24 Vice-Chair Engle asked about the open space on the west with the Master
25 Plan. Rod Gajewski stated that would be cut out from practices and items like
26 that. The concept is it could be a cemetery. He mentioned that on Monday's
27 the trash cans at Veteran's Memorial Park can be overflowing and trash around
28 the areas.

29
30 Larry Nichols stated it should be designated as a special use park, which
31 activities would be restricted to one or two uses, which differs from a general
32 use park. One people have the idea of a memorial park in mind the usage
33 becomes more to the purpose of the special use. Before you are two goals,
34 one to get recommendation to the City Manager that the grounds be
35 recognized for the purpose of the veterans remembrance, and also that the
36 Veteran's Advisory Board duty and authority is to recommend facility
37 improvement to the City Manager and City Council to maintain the facility. He
38 believes that would go a long way to governing how the different usage of the
39 park from different people.

40
41 Board Member Schuller mentioned that the facility improvement then shifts to
42 the City Manager and City Council, does that then shift from Parks and
43 Recreation maintaining that facility. What comments have been made and
44 what resources are available? Larry Nichols stated it brought to this Board for
45 a recommendation to the City Manager. It does not mean that the
46 maintenance of the park would move. Chair McClure stated there needs to be

1 clarity on that as it says, "maintain the facility." Franco Granillo stated if it is
2 going to be a special use facility and going to veterans use only, then the
3 maintenance will have to be looked at as Parks and Recreation would not be
4 able to maintain it as it should be in that situation. He believes it would be best
5 to treat as a private area to be contracted or maintenance turned over to
6 others. He stated the west side of the facility, the memorial walkway would be
7 extended down west on the left hand side of the field that is there now. There
8 are utilities under the field and those could be used to light and water the
9 extension of the memorial walkway. Rod Gajewski stated each of the 13
10 veterans organizations has a month where they do limited park maintenance.
11 Franco Granillo stated they do have a good partnership with the veterans
12 groups. He feels it should be dedicated maintenance daily for the level it
13 requires and the use. It is on a system so they see it once or twice a week
14 only instead of daily and they count on the veterans groups to let the City know
15 when something is out of place.

16
17 It was asked if the City maintains other cemeteries. There are cemeteries
18 under City property but not under the Parks and Recreation maintenance
19 schedule.

20
21 Vice-Chair Engle moved that they table this action item until the July 21st
22 meeting; Board Member Schuller seconded.

23
24 Vice-Chair Engle stated he recognizes the deep significance of the location to
25 the veterans, but the worry is the loss of open space for the community
26 members in the area. Also to be able to consider more carefully. Board
27 Member Schuller would like to revisit the Master Plan for this park. She wants
28 to be sure it is in line with removal of the playground equipment, and the long-
29 term vision of that park is and coming in line. Her other concern is vandalism
30 and that the cameras have helped reduce that. Also discuss some additional
31 signage in the short term. Chair McClure added that there should be a
32 consideration about expending, especially if there is a need for enforcement
33 that can be enabled by saying there is a clear delineation between a Veteran's
34 Memorial Park and public park. Truncating it is going to add in anybody's mind
35 that it isn't a park, expansion of the parking lot, car shows there, there will be
36 similar problems. Signage will help. Looking at the Master Plan again is going
37 to help for the Board to be able to say these are some of the aspects that are
38 needed, and have the veterans consider as well to move forward with a name
39 change in the future.

40

7 **7.1 FY23 Budget – Joy Ann Lucero, Management Analyst, Parks &**
8 **Recreation:**
9

10 Joy Ann Lucero stated the total Parks and Recreation by program. Special
11 revenue funds, state, local, and federal grants, legislative appropriations and
12 donations. There are 13 programs which include with the budget: Office of
13 the Director \$5.1 million; Special Projects; Construction Maintenance; Keep
14 Las Cruces Beautiful \$164,000; Medians and ROWs (Right-of-Way); Parks,
15 Sports Fields and Community Forestry \$11,600,000; Health and Fitness;
16 Community Recreation \$1.5 million; Employee Wellness; Skills Development
17 \$579,000; Community Events \$606,000; Out of School Time; and Youth
18 Development and Diversion \$395,000. The grand total of \$28,040,752 budget.
19

20 General fund only and by program: Personnel, operating, and capital. Special
21 Projects has \$407,000; Medians and ROW \$1.3 million; Health and Fitness
22 \$2.4 million; Employee Wellness \$126,000; Community Events \$604,000; Out
23 of School Time \$1.1 million. General fund total budget for FY23 is
24 \$18,165,000.
25

26 Every year there is an opportunity to request additional budget on top of the
27 status quo budget. A list of additional requested was shown. With the new
28 50-meter pool need four full time positions and operating budget; with East
29 Mesa Public Recreation Complex opening need eight full time positions and
30 operating budget; asking for one park operations district manager; also for two
31 park maintenance workers for the south, as well as two for the north; asked for
32 one project manager; and on Parks and Recreation Deputy Director. Of the
33 requests, the top five were approved, but the pool was \$749,000 and East
34 Mesa Complex was \$782,000 those were lowered to \$562,000 and \$524,000.
35 Total of additional requests are \$1.5 million.
36

37 One of the biggest expenses is temp agency. A breakdown of programs that
38 use temps and their contribution was shown. First is Out of School time they
39 receive \$7,000 which is used for monitor positions as needed. Construction
40 Maintenance received \$20,000 and this is for one temp that performs daily
41 duties listed. Community Forestry received \$35,000 for one full time temp to
42 help with tree planting and removal, as well as community garden
43 maintenance. Special Projects and Construction Maintenance, those
44 programs share a budget of \$62,000 for one temp to assist with CIP projects
45 and public input meetings. Keep Las Cruces Beautiful received \$71,000 for
46 two temps to assist with graffiti removal in the City. Medians and ROWs

1 received \$118,000, for three full time temps. Health and Fitness, \$148,000,
2 for a certified pool operator and to help for positions with the new pool. Parks
3 received \$459,000, that covers 14 temps for the listed duties and they work on
4 weekends. Sports Fields, received \$468,000, need 14 temps to prep sports
5 fields and to help with nonathletic fields, including dog park, Butterfield
6 shooting range, the archery range, and the wetlands. Total temp agency
7 budget is over \$1.3 million.
8

9 General revenue fund collected from programs, classes, leagues, all charged
10 activities. Pre-shutdown the City received \$829,000. During the shutdown it
11 dropped to about \$45,000. Now back up to \$450,000 in revenue. This is lower
12 than the past due to the after school program being free now. It was free
13 starting December 2021, before then it brought in \$225,000.
14

15 Parks budget compared to other departments. For FY23 the Police has almost
16 \$30 million, Fire \$21 million and Parks is second highest in the City at \$28
17 million.
18

19 CIP projects, a partial list was shown as it is a very long list. A few include,
20 skate park improvements, Chandler Tank Phase 1, BMX Track parking lot and
21 ADA improvements, Tortugas trail, Doña Ana Move trail, new skate park plan
22 and design, A. Fielder Memorial, Safe Haven renovations, Burn Lake shelters
23 and improvements, park and security lighting, Sonoma Ranch Mile 2,
24 Women's Veteran's Monument lighting repairs, and Abuelo Park playground
25 equipment installation. All the projects on the current slide have been
26 completed as of FY22. Other projects that are not on the CIP, Lions handball
27 wall painting, disc golf course design, Lions handball court surfacing repairs,
28 we planted 257 trees and removed 250 trees. Installing two more benches at
29 Paz Ballfield and Young Park. Poured a slab for Veteran's Monument and
30 awaiting the monument. Updated a media room for teen programming.
31 Painted the exterior and exterior of East Mesa Recreation Center.
32

33 FY22 community events. This is a partial list: Music in the Park; Movies in the
34 Park; Family Game Nights; assisted with National Night Out; Pumpkin
35 Palooza; the Candy Drop; Father/Daughter Dance; Mayor's Jazz Fest;
36 Mother's Day Concert; Tree Lighting; 4th of July; 4th of July Electric Light
37 Parade. Total community events that Parks and Rec held or assisted with in
38 FY22 was 72.
39

40 Reservations and registrations for FY22 was shown, including free programs
41 including gymnastics; land and water fitness classes; 23,000 went to the
42 weight room; adult sports 148 teams enrolled; recreational sports over 4,000;
43 open swim over 30,000; therapeutics over 10,000; park and trail reservations
44 725. A grand total of 119,334 reservations and registrations.
45

46 Full time positions. This year there were 122 full time positions. With the

1 newly approved 17 positions that were granted, they will start FY23 with a total
2 of 139 full time positions.

3
4 Lastly shows the cities that are similar in population and budget compared to
5 Las Cruces. This does not include population density. City of Las Cruces has
6 population around 102,000 and we have a budget of \$28 million. Yuma,
7 Arizona, population 97,000, budget \$19 million. Allen, Texas, population
8 106,000, budget \$16 million. Boulder, Colorado, population 108,000, budget
9 \$28 million. The City of Las Cruces has a budget 40% more than Yuma,
10 Arizona; a budget 69% more than Allen, Texas; and only a 1% difference
11 between us and Boulder, Colorado.

12
13 Vice-Chair Engle asked to return to budget request that was less than
14 requested and how is that going to affect. Joy Ann Lucero stated for the new
15 pool and for East Mesa Public Recreation Complex they requested a full year
16 budget, but since they are not going to be open until after December, these
17 numbers reflect half a year. The following fiscal year they will ask for enough
18 for a full year.

19
20 Board Member Schuller asked why the use of temps instead of hiring. Joy
21 Ann Lucero stated they have discussed that with administration for several
22 years. A full time park maintenance worker, including benefits, was less than
23 \$5,000 more than a temp, they would be a City employee, stay longer, receive
24 benefits. Now with the new administration, they are geared more toward temp
25 agencies. Robert Nunez stated they utilize the temp services for the transition
26 of hiring contractor part time staff. It can take 6-10 weeks to get people hired
27 so the temp service fills the gaps with vacancies. Franco Granillo stated they
28 had part time on the staff 8-9 years ago, by state law if they are only part time
29 they have to sit out for 90 days so they don't receive benefits. So losing those
30 staff members for 90 days then the whole process begins for hiring again. He
31 cannot have ballfields, trails, and areas go without maintenance for 90 days.
32 They are trained and have the same equipment and so they are one step
33 ahead for becoming hired.

34
35 Chair McClure stated we are comparing to other cities and it seems like
36 Boulder, Colorado there is a lot of focus on outdoor recreation too. Wish there
37 was more consideration on how does quality of life factor in, how is quality of
38 life here versus Allen, Texas. She suggested population is not necessarily the
39 end all.

40

7 **8. Staff Member Comments:**
8

9 Robert Nunez update on out of school time programs. They are in full swing in the
10 summer. It is a very short summer, four weeks away from the school year returns.
11 A lot of field trips, swimming, outdoor activities. K-5 programs are very active. Teen
12 programs are doing a lot of partnerships with NMSU, Friends of the Organ
13 Mountains, some repelling last week. Positive of stories in regards to some of the
14 teenagers with difficulty with trust with adults. And it got them involved with the
15 contractor present as well as City staff. There was an increase from COVID year of
16 number of participants, but not where we should be at. Keep Las Cruces Beautiful,
17 final report is due July 5th. Also saw an increase from COVID year and slowly
18 climbing back to regular numbers. Team Up to Clean Up in District 5 this Saturday,
19 on Thurman and Sonoma Ranch. Also Holman Road and Bataan Memorial West.
20

21 Board Member Schuller asked about not charging for the out of school programs
22 and was that one time deal or permanent. Robert Nunez stated that was presented
23 to the City Council and they approved as transition through COVID and out of
24 COVID. Looking for at least one fiscal year of providing some services to the
25 families. Traditionally they were charging \$400 a semester for after school program
26 and \$200 a month for the summer programs. They are looking to do that beginning
27 of fall. Sometime in the fall they will present to Council for further direction.
28

29 Franco Granillo talked about RecTrac, program for registration. They are looking at
30 getting this online for July 9th event. The staff is looking at testing two different tasks
31 to get the registration online. If for some reason they are not able to get this online
32 via their guidelines or restrictions, it will give Phil time to alter his setup for
33 registration so nobody is standing around.

37 Vice-Chair Engle stating that the budget it is nice to see Parks and Rec is just up
38 there. Nice to be able to spend that kind of money on our community. Greatly
39 appreciate that and all the hard work the department does.

42 Improvements Advisory Committee meeting earlier and she suggests an update on
